

# PROJECT EVANGELISM

**Project Evangelism** is an interdenominational faith organisation based in Northern Ireland. Our vision is to train and mobilize Christians for Church based and outreach evangelism, and to reach all people with the Gospel of Christ.

## HISTORY OF PROJECT EVANGELISM

Ken Terhovan, a Christian from South Africa, started Project Evangelism in England in the early 1960's. He perceived the role of Project as that of working alongside local churches and evangelising in areas not reached by them. His goal for the ministry was to lead others to faith in Christ, then encourage discipleship and placement of new converts into churches for training and spiritual growth.

John Moxen joined the organisation in 1965 and worked for three years at its centre in Derbyshire. He became Director in 1969.

Some time later, John was invited to conduct outreach meetings in Northern Ireland. He visited the Province on a number of occasions before being encouraged to take up permanent residence and bring the ministry to Northern Ireland on a full-time basis. He and his family made the move in 1969.

**PROJECT EVANGELISM** was based in Portrush on the North Antrim coast, for 20 years. While there, Project was involved in outreach throughout the Province. They also did extensive work among the crowds who came to Portrush at Easter; for the NW 200 motorbike race in May (which usually attracts in excess of 100,000 people) and through the summer season.

A Bible School was started there that provided discipleship and training for people from many different backgrounds, including overseas students and others who had been unemployed.

In 1986 **PROJECT EVANGELISM** purchased Longfields School in Glenarm, a small seaside community in County Antrim. This was renamed *Stillwaters* and was renovated to provide accommodation for up to 25 people. This is still used as a base for outreach to the local area and beyond. It has facilitated the development and maintenance of relationships with local churches and the community.

In 1992 an American team from YWAM came to assist in an outreach from Glenarm. It was seen that these overseas visitors were able to cross over religious and political divides, where local teams may have encountered more difficulty.

Following this visit, an opportunity arose in 1993 for John Moxen to visit IMPACT (the Presbyterian Church of America's Short-term Missions Department) and a number of colleges, for the purpose of recruiting teams for short-term mission in N Ireland. There were a number of invitations to take college chapel, and to speak at church services and mission conferences. In this way, contacts expanded and relationships with American Christians developed.

In 1990 **PROJECT EVANGELISM** moved from Portrush to Templemore Avenue in Belfast. Here the work focused on a small cafe for outreach and day and evening classes.

John had always felt that, in order for the ministry to develop further, a larger and more attractive base was required. Murlough House was an answer to prayer of 20 years, having many of the facilities required, as well as potential for further development.

In a huge step of faith, *PROJECT EVANGELISM* purchased the house in 1994, at a cost of approximately £300,000, and so began the latest phase. This incredible financial commitment was undertaken trusting in God's provision and the building was completely paid for in 5½ years. It is one of *PROJECT EVANGELISM'S* principles never to seek or solicit financial support. Instead, we believe that if God's work is done in God's way, it will not lack God's funds.

## MURLOUGH HOUSE

Murlough House dates back to 1859. It was built as a summer residence for the Earl of Downshire and for many years the Downshire family would spend about three months a year on the Murlough estate. The Downshires sold the estate in the 1950's and the house has subsequently been owned by a number of different groups, including Queen's University of Belfast, who built the teaching block adjacent to the main house, in 1984. Since Project Evangelism took over the building there have been large investments of time, money and effort, in order to make it the place we see today.



The house is superbly situated within Murlough Nature Reserve, (owned by the National Trust) and overlooks Dundrum Bay. It is a wonderful base from which to take walks and hikes and generally explore the local habitat.

Since being based in Murlough House, the ministry has sought to reach out to many areas of the Province, and South Down in particular. This has happened through children's programmes (such as Vacation Bible Schools), working alongside local churches, and specific outreach events.

The teams that have visited have been engaged in soccer schools, puppet ministry, drama and visiting schools to take religious education classes and schools' morning assemblies.

Project Evangelism's main outreach is to the local area of Dundrum and Newcastle. God has led us to establish links with local churches, sustaining growth through their young people, discipling them and helping them grow in Christ so they will feed back into the church and get involved in their local area to promote Christ to the community.

## ***DUNDRUM***

The village of Dundrum is about a mile from Murlough House. There are the interesting remains of a medieval castle that date from the 12<sup>th</sup> century.

The village has grown over the last five years, with ongoing building programmes bringing newcomers from many different locations to settle in the area. With this population growth, opportunities for outreach and evangelism have also expanded.

*PROJECT EVANGELISM* has a number of links with the community and many local people are supportive of its ministry. We are fully aware of the importance of building good relationships with village residents and seek always to work with them, sensitive to varying needs and expectations across the community.



## ***NEWCASTLE***

About four miles south of Dundrum is the town of Newcastle. Newcastle is a seaside town, popular with summer visitors. Its location beside the Mourne Mountains also attracts walkers and climbers on day trips and vacations. The holiday crowds present great opportunities for evangelism during the summer months.



## INFORMATION YOU NEED

### COSTS

The cost for teams is as follows and includes accommodation, meals and transportation for outreach:

Up to 2 weeks           \$385 per person per week (\$55 per day)  
Remaining weeks       \$315 per person per week (\$45 per day)  
*Extra days for individuals may be arranged, if space is available.*

### Intern/Summer Staff

The cost for interns and/or summer staff, which includes accommodation, meals and transportation for outreach is as follows:

4 week minimum       \$210 per person per week (\$30 per day) (*4 weeks minimum*)

### ADDITIONAL COSTS

Airport transfers to and from Murlough House will be arranged. The cost of transfers will vary according to numbers on team and which airport is used (Belfast or Dublin).

There is one 'day out' in each seven days for sightseeing - we will organize this for you, unless you desire otherwise. *PLEASE NOTE - This is optional and cost of transport and expenses for the day are the responsibility of the team.*

### DEPOSIT AND FINAL PAYMENT

A deposit of \$1000 (for teams) should be paid as soon as dates are confirmed. If you have a good reason for cancelling your reservation after the deposit has been paid, we will refund 50% up to six weeks prior to arrival date. After that there is no refund.

*Full payment of the balance must be made prior to or shortly after arrival.*

### PAPERWORK

Each team member is required to fill out an Application Form. **Completed applications should be sent in a single batch by the Team Leader at least *four weeks* before the date of arrival.**

Completed Applications should include:

- Application Form
- Personal Testimony (1x page)
- Recent photograph (*except* 'formal' picture)
- 2 references
- Signed Project Evangelism Covenant and Basis of Faith
- Criminal Record Check provided by Police Department (for everyone 18 and over) \*\*

It is important that at the same time, or earlier, you complete the **Team Info Sheet** and return it to **Richie** at [richardsdundrum@yahoo.co.uk](mailto:richardsdundrum@yahoo.co.uk) so he can arrange and coordinate your programme. This needs to be completed as soon as possible to enable him to contact schools, Churches, youth groups etc. (A Team Info Sheet should be at the end of this document).

\*\* Due to increasing awareness of child protection issues in the UK, we are required to ensure that all staff and volunteers who, in the course of their duties, have substantial access to children, do not have any previous convictions in regard to children. For this reason, we ask that each team member, aged 18 years and over, produces a declaration from their local Police Authority with regard to any criminal convictions.

## INDIVIDUAL PREPARATION

### Immigration

Each team member should carry with them a current valid passport. For US citizens, there are generally no visa requirements for visitor's entry into the UK. However, it may be advisable to confirm the situation in each case.

### What to Bring

*Clothing:* The weather in N Ireland can be unpredictable. For teams visiting through the winter season (approx October -April), it is advisable to include a warm coat (preferably waterproof), an umbrella and comfortable footwear.

- ◆ Bring clothing, which can be layered to suit varying temperatures.
- ◆ Summer clothing: layering still required and waterproof jacket and/or umbrella still advisable.
- ◆ You should include clothes that would be suitable for church (dress/skirt for women, shirt/tie for men).
- ◆ Clothing for sports nights and swimsuit for summer months.
- ◆ Towels and washcloths; sandals for wearing to the shower.
- ◆ Toiletries (soap, shampoo, etc.)

\*\*\*\* Please note: Electrical appliances in the UK operate on 240v. If you wish to bring a **US** hairdryer or other electrical item, you should also bring a voltage adaptor. \*\*\*\*

*Bedding:* You need to bring a sleeping bag. Undersheets, pillows and pillowcases will be provided.

*Laundry:* There are laundry facilities (2 washers, 2 dryers) at Murlough House that will be available to teams at specified times in the day. The charge is £1.50 per wash and £1.50 per dry including detergent.

**Money, Credit/Debit Cards etc.** The currency in N Ireland is Pounds Sterling (£)

Your main expenses are all covered, but you will probably need some spending money for entrance to tourist sites, postcards, stamps and gift shopping. We estimate that \$200 - \$500 would be adequate. You have various options for how to bring and change your money. (*Please note* - Some Banks won't accept \$100 bills)

*Exchanging dollars in N. Ireland* - within the first few days, we'll take you to the bank to exchange dollars for £ sterling. The bank will make a charge/commission for this, so it is an option for teams to appoint one person to change all the money, and divide the single commission charge.

*US Travelers Checks* - you have to change these at the bank personally, again you pay commission. You will need your passport as ID, but they are secure if they get lost or stolen.

*British Travelers Checks* - if you buy these in the US, you won't have to pay commission to change them in N. Ireland. Again these are secure.

**Please do not change money at the airport - this will take too much time if your transport is waiting.**

*Credit and Debit/Check cards* - Most stores will accept MasterCard, Visa, American Express and Access credit cards, and debit/check cards linked to these. You'll save on commission, and should also be able to withdraw cash from automatic teller machines (ATMs) with them. However, small shops and cafes may not accept them; so don't plan to use your credit/debit card exclusively.

*Euros* - If your team plans to spend time in the Republic of Ireland, say in Dublin, you will need Irish money which is *Euros* (same as those used in Europe). You can obtain these before you come; in N Ireland, or change money when you cross the border. The best way is to withdraw *Euros* from the ATMs when you get there.

**Vacation Insurance** - each team member needs to ensure that they have health care cover for the duration of their stay.

## **STAYING AT MURLOUGH HOUSE**

Most of the rooms where teams will be accommodated are laid out as dormitories. Your room assignment will have been organized before you arrive and staff members will appreciate your co-operation in remaining where you have been assigned.

Guys and girls will be accommodated separately, with shower facilities located conveniently for each group. It is a rule of the house that girls are not permitted in guys' bedrooms, nor guys in girls' bedrooms, at any time.

There are a limited number of rooms for leaders and married couples, so special accommodation requests need to be made well ahead of time. Every effort will be made to meet your requests, but this will not always be possible, particularly if there is another team staying in the house at the same time.

Since your stay may overlap with another team and may involve sharing accommodation, clean up and outreach opportunities, it may be helpful to be prepared for this and as a team discuss how you might best work and live with people whom you do not know. It will probably require flexibility and ongoing co-operation!

## **CATERING**

Three main meals will be served each day - breakfast, lunch and high tea, plus an evening snack. These will be fully catered, so teams need not be burdened by organizing catering of any kind. Special dietary requirements (i.e. specifically food allergies/intolerances) should be notified to Murlough House staff well ahead of time.

In general, the main meal of the day will be served at around 1:00 p.m., though this can be flexible, depending on the team's schedule on a particular day.

If additional snacks are required throughout the day, there is a tuck shop in the house, selling sweets, chocolate, crisps and soft drinks. It is not necessary that you bring other food items from home. Murlough House and N Ireland in general should be able to satisfy most taste buds for the whole of your short stay!

Following each meal, teams will be organized, on a rota basis, into smaller groups for wash-up. This is a team effort and each member will be expected to participate as assigned. Instructions as to 'how,' 'what' and 'where' will be posted in the kitchen and wash-up areas. Any further queries or questions can be answered by the House Manager.

In addition, there is a half-hour clean-up time scheduled every morning after breakfast, which will be shared among all the groups staying at the time. This is the quickest and most efficient way to ensure that the house is kept clean and tidy at all times, and maintained to a good standard, for the comfort of all who stay here.

Apart from teams who are involved in wash-up duties at particular times, the kitchen/wash-up area is generally restricted to staff only. This restriction also applies to staff quarters and the offices, unless you are working on a task, which requires access to these areas, and permission has been given.

It is our aim as staff here at Murlough House to look after the house and its grounds as far as possible, by keeping it tidy, respecting its age and using its contents with tender loving care. We want it to be a welcoming and attractive place for all who stay here and so appreciate the co-operation of groups in maintaining the house, taking care of your belongings and avoiding covering the house with unnecessary clutter. Please be responsible for keeping your belongings with you, since Murlough House staff cannot be responsible for any loss or damage to personal property.

If, in the course of your stay, something belonging to the house is lost or damaged, you should report this as soon as possible to the Director or any other member of Murlough House staff. We feel that this is a matter of integrity and co-operation.

## TYPICAL DAY AT MURLOUGH HOUSE

While your days at Murlough House will be influenced by the nature of your activities, the following is a typical schedule for teams staying here on short-term mission trips

During your stay, you will have opportunity for some free time to take advantage of local walks or the beach. There will also be some opportunity for shopping or sightseeing as a group beyond Newcastle.

## TRANSPORTATION DURING YOUR STAY

Transportation for all group journeys will be provided in Murlough House minibuses. In general, due to petrol costs in the UK and the general wear and tear costs for vehicles being used by multiple drivers, we are not able to provide transportation for individual journeys.

Our vehicles are insured for drivers who are 25 and over with a valid drivers license. If you meet these requirements, we may need your help in providing transportation. We will take care to ensure that before you drive for the first time you know the basics of UK traffic laws, including speed limits, rights of way at intersections, and roundabouts. It is the driver's responsibility to ensure that the vans never exceed their passenger capacity, which is usually 15, including the driver.

Passengers are required to wear seatbelts. All vehicles must be locked at all times, and keys returned to the office or kitchen on your return. A sheet for recording journey details is provided in each vehicle and should be returned to the office at the end of each week. Vehicles should never be taken on an errand without permission, or without being clearly assigned.

The drive to Murlough House runs through a Nature Reserve, and is partly owned by the National Trust. The speed limit is 15mph and is enforced by a number of speed bumps. Drive carefully and look out for walkers, dogs and cyclists. Sometimes there are also horses or cattle on the Reserve.

## COMMUNICATION

### Telephone:

There will be a 'phone available; Calling cards may be purchased for telephone use.

### E-mail

There are computers in the Library and the house is totally wireless enabled.

### Mail

Letters to the US take approximately 5-10 days for delivery. Stamps can be purchased at the Tuck Shop Trolley (50p for postcards, and depending on weight, either 50p or 72p for letters). They can be mailed by Murlough staff. The postal address for receiving mail here is:

## **WORKING FROM MURLOUGH HOUSE – MINISTRY OPPORTUNITIES AND EVENTS**

We want you to return home challenged and revitalized in your faith. Each day, you will usually attend one or two teaching sessions - one to prepare your heart and challenge you, and the other to train you in the different types of evangelism you will be involved in. If you are not focused correctly, your outreach will be ineffective - the heart that knows little of brokenness and yielding cannot serve effectively.

The basis of Project Evangelism is building relationships. We believe that people are not to be seen simply as projects for salvation, but as precious lives whom God has given us the opportunity to meet and get to know. We believe in building real friendships in order to show people the love of Christ, with the aim of producing disciples, not just decisions. Building on this view of evangelism, there are several different outreaches Project Evangelism uses in order to meet people and open doors for sharing the Gospel.

### ***Church Services***

You may get the opportunity to take some worship services in the churches you work with during your stay. Be prepared to lead choruses, give testimonies, present children's messages, or lead intercessory prayer. You may also be asked to lead children's and young people's Sunday School classes.

In most churches in N Ireland, there is a recognized protocol as to appropriate behaviour during worship services. This may be more reserved than you are accustomed to in the US. We would ask that you keep this in mind, and be sensitive to cultural differences at all times. You may wish to avoid chewing gum in church or leaving the sanctuary mid way through the service except in an emergency.

### ***School Assemblies and Classes***

Many UK classrooms and assemblies are marked by more religious freedom than in the US. Ministers are frequently invited to schools to speak, read the Bible, and present the Gospel. Each School offers a course on "Religious Education" and many secondary schools (equivalent to US high schools) have a Scripture Union - a school-sponsored club that meets after school for prayer and Bible Study. However, although there may be freer access to the Gospel in the school-system than in the US, there is a relatively small (and perhaps decreasing) proportion of pupils who are effectively reached and whose lives demonstrate the impact of knowing Christ. More children than ever are unfamiliar with the Gospel message and are bombarded by many competing demands for their attention at an earlier and earlier age.

Some children may have a little understanding of the claims of the Gospel, but it is frequently a limited view and perhaps biased by association with particular groups or sections of the community. To many others, this is a wholly new and perhaps even alien message, which often stands in direct opposition to the mindset they are more regularly exposed to. The Gospel needs to be presented in all its fullness, and yet with regard for the background and understanding of each child. We must strive to communicate the Gospel in new and creative ways, focusing on relationships rather than rules. This is an uncompromising message, yet it is centered on a relationship with God through Christ - a message of grace and of hope.

#### **School Assemblies**

This is a gathering of students (lasting approximately 15 minutes) at the beginning of the school day. It is a formal time, when the kids sing a hymn, and the School Principal leads prayers. It is also an opportunity for the Principal to address school-wide problems. You should be prepared to communicate the Gospel quickly, efficiently and creatively. You can do this through dramas illustrating Biblical stories/parables, special music, or personal testimony. Be careful to communicate the message clearly, without assuming any previous knowledge. This is never an appropriate time to ask for decisions for Christ. It can be a good time to promote your main programme.

#### **Classes**

After the assembly, some teams may be able to participate in the classroom throughout the day. The class times vary from 30 minutes to one hour and each class averages 25-30 students, though classes may combine for the duration of your visit. You may use this time to teach some aspect of American culture (history, geography etc.) The main objective is to direct the children's attention back to the Gospel, so you should think how you may best make a link between American culture and Gospel principles.

## *Coffee Bars*

This is your chance to see people's lives change as you share your faith in a non-threatening environment. This is not the typical American coffee bar, this is a drop-in centre, where young people come to hang out.

Project Evangelism uses premises in Newcastle called *Kairos*, conveniently located on the main street and in Dundrum we use the *Crosspoint Centre*. We use various means of contact including arts, drama, Christian modern music, sports and other programmes. A number of teams have had a special event in the community and then invited the young people back for worship and a Jesus-centred talk.

The key word in the coffee bar programme is flexibility. Each night, you should be prepared with drama, some songs and a brief message. Each member of your team needs to be ready to share his or her personal testimony at any moment. (See "Guidelines"). While people are speaking up front, the rest of the team needs to encourage everyone to listen. You can do this by:

- Not serving coffee at that time;
- Winding down conversations at tables;
- Not walking round the coffee bar during the programme.

In addition to preparing the programme for each night, your group will be divided into four teams: serving, praying, fishing and witnessing. These teams rotate throughout the week so that everyone has a chance to do every job. Your team leader will organize your schedule and communicate it to you.

*Serving Team* This group is responsible for serving tea and coffee throughout the evening, except when someone is speaking up-front. Your purpose is to make people feel comfortable and open to conversation. You need to watch for distractions and take care of them as quickly as possible. Also, designate one person to be in charge of making sure you have all the supplies you need for that night, including cups, milk, coffee, tea, sugar, etc. Another person needs to be a runner between the witnessing and prayer teams so that the prayer team knows how to pray more effectively for those sharing their faith.

*Prayer Team*: This group meets in a separate room and prays throughout the night, constantly interceding for those who might come to faith in Christ. You will be kept up to date through the runner from the serving team.

*Fishing Team*: This group goes out on the street thirty minutes before the coffee bar begins, with the purpose of bringing people into the coffee bar. If you see that the crowd thins throughout the night, you may need to seek some more interest on the street. If, however, you see that the place is full, join the witnessing team. You may also need to use personal evangelism techniques when you are out on the street.

*Witnessing Team*: This team starts up conversations with people at the tables, seeking to build relationships while looking for opportunities to share the Gospel. When someone is speaking or performing, try to wind down conversation so that everyone can hear the message up front. Use the time after each presentation to build on what the speaker said. We'll give you more guidelines on personal evangelism when you arrive.

## *CHILDREN'S MEETINGS*

VBS / Kids Club - On the first day, you may not be able to start your teaching programme - the early days are vital for building relationships rather than pushing the Gospel. You also need to bear in mind that your programme, which is generally held outside, particularly in the summer months, can often be interrupted by inclement weather - so it should be flexible.

*Possible programme* - Games / snack / song / drama / memory verse / quiz. It is important to maintain the children's attention throughout. Our goal is to present the Gospel message clearly and simply, illustrating the five points of salvation: **Fact of Sin; Penalty of Sin; Penalty paid by Christ; Not of Works; Must Accept.**

Your programme may simply be a part of this process, as other teams may have gone before you and still others will come after you. While we desire that you present the Gospel boldly, our policy is never to ask children to pray with you to receive salvation, either by raising their hands or coming up front.

Children are often eager to please; therefore they may pray a prayer only because they know you want them to rather than being genuinely convicted of sin. Instead, you can tell the children that if they want to know more about Jesus, they can talk to a team member after the meeting, or write a letter, telling you how they trusted the Lord.

## ***OPEN-AIR MEETINGS***

This type of outreach is done outside (in the open-air) in an open space in a busy part of town. The meetings consist of songs, dramas, testimonies and preaching, with the purpose of drawing a crowd and presenting the Gospel. The structure of open-air meetings is flexible and can be arranged to best suit your team.

## ***STREET WORK***

Street work consists of anything from handing out leaflets, advertising outreaches, conducting surveys in targeted areas (neighborhoods), to passing out tracts. While our purposes for street work vary from publicity to direct evangelism, the principles behind these projects are the same. Be courteous yet excited about what you're doing. Chances are, your American nationality will be a natural attraction. People will want to ask you questions. When you arrive, we'll give you more guidelines about the type of street work your team will be doing.

## ***PERSONAL TESTIMONY***

At some point during the outreach you may be asked to give your testimony. The Bible says "*Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have.*" (1 Peter 3: 15) We hope that you will take time to think about what God has done and is doing in your life and be ready to share when asked.

### ***Purpose of a Testimony:***

The purpose of a personal testimony is not merely to share about your life experiences but rather to convey a particular message to a particular group. Although you always want your testimony to be Spirit led, it is important that you have a clear idea of your purpose and presentation prior to your talk.

### ***Guidelines for your Testimony:***

While we encourage you to organize your testimony according to a particular theme, we also ask that you answer these three questions somewhere in your message:

- Where were you before you met Jesus Christ? (don't glorify your sinful past)
- How did you meet Jesus? (your conviction of sin)
- How has your relationship with Jesus changed your life? (God's continuing relationship with you)

Naturally, everyone's testimony will vary. Remember that your overall purpose is to glorify God, not sin. Thus, each point should take about the same amount of time in your talk.

### ***What to AVOID:***

- The phrases : "got saved" "grace" "confession".
- Being too long - keep it to less than 10 minutes
- Dwelling on the sin you once had rather than the victory you now have.

## ***FINAL THOUGHTS AND ENCOURAGEMENT***

*PROJECT EVANGELISM* has several handouts on evangelism, on witnessing, verses for memorization, etc., that will be given to you during training periods. Take the time to read them carefully and apply the information. The information on them is helpful and worth keeping. We cannot be as effective if we do not have a thorough knowledge of those we are witnessing to as well as a thorough knowledge of who we are witnessing about!

We hold prayer to be the most powerful tool we have. If you have not yet begun to pray for your time of ministry in Northern Ireland, start now! Any account you will read of successful missionaries is always based around the power of prayer and how God answers prayer after prayer. Do not let this aspect of your preparation slip. On the contrary, prayer should be of the utmost importance.

You will not accomplish anything while you are here. God will do it all. The power of God's Living Word and the moving of the Holy Spirit saves souls and changes lives. It is certainly not anything we say or do that will bring people to salvation, although by making yourself available, God can use you as a tool for His work.
